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Mechanics & Body Men by Chuck Diamond

I consider myself lucky – I grew up in a family of "car guys." By this I mean most of the men (and some women) worked in the car industry. Cars in general were always a topic of discussion at family gatherings. For the most part, my father and uncles were all what was referred to as "white collar workers," a term I came to associate with "can't fix crap" (if you or your father are/were a w.c. worker please accept my apology if you're mechanically inclined - that was just First the name - unless you are a fairly new member not my experience in my youth).

men they held in the highest esteem. The first was their "mechanic" and the second was their "body man." Evidence of their high regard was the fact that their names and telephone numbers were written on the garage wall, a puzzling fact since no one had a phone in their garage back then. Names were frequently crossed out and new ones added; the reasons for this were never fully explained. And, just to convince you of the exalted place held by these men, I was raised Catholic and never once did I see our family priest's name on our garage wall.

To this day I can picture my father, hood up on the car, scratching his head and saying "guess I better call Joe (or who-



ever the current mechanic of choice was)" or, looking at rusted rocker panels and saying "better have Fred take care of this." I loved my father; he had many admirable qualities, but I was determined not to be like him when it came to being fearful of whatever gremlins lurked under the hood of a car. As a result, whenever I wasn't fooling around with wood I could usually be found across the field at the Johnson's house. Living there were two friends about my age that shared an affinity for taking things apart and putting them back together (sometimes without any "optional" parts being left over!). So, that's how my limited mechanical skills developed, although I still keep a name or two on my garage wall for when I get in over my head.

Now, the "Body Man". Bumping and painting is a skill that defies my understanding and ability; my few

early attempts when income was limited are best described as "dismal." Wherever I lived I had a favorite body shop nearby that took care of any needs I had. I never had a name on my garage wall though - until

to JAGM you probably know Tom. He has been a part As a result, every male in my extended family had two of our club for as long as I can remember. Tom is and has been a "body man" par excellence since he was a teenager. He specializes in British cars and understands how they come apart and go back together as well as anyone. Don't think of him for mechanical work though – he can do it but it is not his forte; I'm pretty sure he would refer you to someone else.

> I have seen Tom's work often enough to know that when I had need of those skills he was first on my mind. About 15 years ago I had an incident that required repairs to my bonnet. At the time I was still working, so for the sake of convenience I took the car to the local restoration shop that had painted the car in 2000. Living in a small town, we tended to support each other.

Since I had a friendly relationship with the owner it seemed a logical choice. When I picked the car up I must have been dazzled by the paint work – it was beautiful and I was thrilled to have the car back. What I didn't immediately notice was a less than perfect bonnet fit. It was proud at the left side of the cowl and when the bonnet closed it hit on the sill. I should mention that when I took the car in I discovered my friend had just begun a short stay with the Dept. of Corrections; it seems the bar we frequented and his home were just a little too far apart – can you spell DUI? Darn! However, the guys that had worked on my car before were still there so I had no concern. I should have taken it back immediately, but I didn't. It

was the beginning of summer and this shop is not famous for their prompt turn-around time. I decided to wait for the owner's return as his son and I really didn't hit it off – he had a dislike for (continued on page 8)

foreign cars and only wanted to work on street rods and muscle cars. According to him, his dad "was doing me a favor by working on my car" (a very expensive one, fortunately covered by insurance). By the time the shop owner was back I was involved in selling my hardware store, buying property, and planning the construction of our "retirement home." The Jag was not a priority, so I lived with the crappy fit. At different Concours sometimes I received a legitimate deduction for "poor bonnet fit" and other times I did not, but I knew eventually I'd have to deal with it.

Fast forward to last year's Concours event. The everpresent Judge Tom Shipley and I stopped to chat. I asked him to check out my bonnet fit – he didn't think it was any big deal to repair, but it would involve a bonnet re-paint. Shortly after that I made arrangements to bring him the car at the end of the driving season. One of my better decisions.

Not only is Tom a pleasure to work with, the man is

also a perfectionist. When the bonnet was off the car he discovered that a number of inner support panels were showing signs of corrosion. His recommendation was to replace them as he was averse to just painting over them. The replacement panels were a lousy fit – just one more obstacle he was able to overcome. Every step

of the way, whenever a new surprise turned up (and, per Tom, they always do – things like a decayed bonnet wiring harness), Tom insisted we do it right, and I agreed in every case. I cite this to demonstrate the quality of his work and what can be expected from him. If slip-shod work is acceptable to you, go somewhere else, you won't get it here. If an area of concern has more than one option for repair he will patiently explain the choices, the pros and cons, detailing the cost differences.

Tom can and will do as much or as little work as you request. In my case he went over the entire car and with a felt tip marker (water-based I hoped) identified all the places where he saw a flaw – this on a car that consistently scored in the mid to high 99+ point range! He has provided me with many photos of his progress so I'm confident the fit and finish will be of the highest quality when he's done. He also keeps meticulous records of his time and materials so you

will have accurate documentation to support the final bill (and insurance companies don't scare him!).

Finally, Tom is a no B.S. kind of guy – he does what he says he will and he does it with integrity. Now that's my kind of "Body Man" and why his name is on my garage wall! Call him if you need him, you won't be sorry. Tell him Chuck sent ya.




