

Curwood Castle Museum



On Saturday, May 18th, under partly-sunny skies and high 70's, twenty JAGM members arrived in Owosso, MI, from Petoskey to Northville and points in between. We met at the Curwood Castle Park at 1:00 through the yard PM. Our first stop was the Curwood Castle Museum. The building was the studio of James Oliver Curwood, one of America's foremost authors. Writing and love

of nature were his boyhood interests and by 1908 Curwood was earning most of his living as a novelist. Most of his stories were adventure tales set in the Canadian North, where



he spent much of his time. During the 1920s, his books were among the most popular in North America, and many were made into movies. The Castle was built in 1922 and a number of his latter works were composed in the tower, overlooking the Shiawassee River.

As we moved down the Shiawassee River toward our second stop at the Shiawassee Arts Center, we stopped to investigate the Heritage Suspension Bridge. You could feel its movements as people walked across. The view of the river was spectacular and Chuck

Mueller recalled for us his earlier experiences canoeing the Shiawassee River. We stopped at the Shiawassee Art Center, which showcases the work of regional and national artists in nine galleries, as well the impressionist painting of Frederick Frieseke.

Our next stop was the Steam Railroad Institute. It was such a nice afternoon that we decided to leave our Jags at the Park and walk the 0.6 miles through town. It took us about 15 minutes.

At the SRI we split into three groups and were led by docents to see two sleeper cars, one passenger car,

keeper. We also went inside a Caboose, and tried out its high perched seats with windows in the middle.

We then moved to their maintenance building. There we met three volunteers just finishing up with some work. We got an up close view of the very big, oily bits of locomotives, including the Pere Marquette 1225 that inspired Disney's Polar Express. Based on the conversations taking

place, our members seemed to have a lot of interest in, and curiosity about these locomotives.

Yankee Air Museum / Ypsilanti Automotive Heritage Museum



On Saturday, April 27th, the ubiquitous spring rains took a break giving us partly sunny skies and nice driving weather to the Yankee Air Museum. Ice Racing a Jaguar in Michigan

Really! Some of you may have heard me speak of it at a Jaguar Club function and maybe thought of it as a novelty. But it is true. The Saginaw Valley Region (SVR) of the Sports Car Club of America (SCCA) has held auto ice racing events in Michigan for over 50 years. When I moved here from PA and joined the local club, I had never heard of it and was skeptical. I went to Ross Lake at Beaverton, watched it, and sure enough I started in a '66 MGB roadster. Actually, it is more like doing "time trials"...not wheel to wheel racing, but rather four cars on the two mile long course at a time, spaced far enough apart for safety reasons.

Basically, cars are classed as: Front wheel drive, stock (SF), prepared (PF); Rear Wheel Drive, stock (SR), prepared (PR); All Wheel Drive, stock (SA), prepared (PA); or Studded Class. Most cars do run with four

good snow tires. All season tires just don't make the grade. It does not matter whether you are driving a 4, 6 or 8 cylinder, turbo charged, supercharged, fuel injected or carbureted...ice is an "equalizer". More power and stiff suspension are not always an advantage.

As the sun came up, myself and a

few others started setting up the course by 7:30 AM. The ice had already been measured at more than 10" thick, perfect for our first ice run of the season. Using a combination of large and small orange cones, the course was set up around the perimeter of the lake with gates and single cones. Typically we use either a 1.5 mile short course or a 2 mile course around an island that cannot be seen from the start / finish. With 1 practice run and 5 timed runs, everyone would get plenty of seat time. Since registration was via computer... www.myautoevents.com, it went quick... sign the waiver, have your car and helmet, go through tech inspection, and get ready to do your practice run. The drivers' meeting would be at 10:30 and hopefully cars would start timed runs by 11 AM. While first heat drivers lined up to run, the 2nd heat drivers would be assigned worker stations with radios

out on the course. The timing van was set to go and cars would be released shortly. Lunch time was after the first heat. Then it was time for the 2nd heat drivers to line up and the 1st heat drivers to take assigned worker stations on the course.

The ice had about 3 to 4" of snow on top, which gave minimal traction for the first of 2 heats. Temperature was in the low 20's and the sky was partly sunny. First heat cars would be rear wheel drive and front wheel drive. Second heat would be all wheel drive and studded cars. I ran our 2011 XF S/C with newer Pirelli snows against an '89 BMW 325i with snow tires. As was the case with many cars, their first run was their best because traction was available. But as the day went on, the ice became very polished. Noo, we don't have a Zamboni to clear the track, but I have to say the studded cars made excellent traction for

each other and the all-wheel drive cars in the second heat. My first run was my best with a 233.387. Josh in the BMW ran his best, 234.850 on his 3rd run. All of the other runs were longer, but it was because we were trying harder, either by braking later, drifting too far out or even spinning out in

an effort to go faster. But...it still comes back to "sometimes going slower is going faster"! It does take a lot of practice, seat time and trying different techniques to get the right combination in ice racing. Plus every car is different. With most newer cars, you have to disable the "stability control". If you don't,

you will notice that the car will bog down and refuse to accelerate.

Well, every great book deserves a sequel. I had earlier reviewed "Jaguar XK120 DHC, Installing the Soft Top and Headliner" by John Gegner and Gregg Philbrick and I realized that the soft top installation was only part of the larger question, how do you start on and go about restoring a classic Jaguar without sending the car and large check to a professional restorer? Well the answer to my question was delivered by John in this more substantial, equally well written, story in 124 pages with 135 photos.

A great addition to any respectable Jaguar library at the cost of \$68 including shipping in the U.S.
