

Mr. Ortiz began his career in 1986 as an intern at WXYT while attending



the Specs Howard School of Broadcasting. After landing a position at the station, he also worked as a producer for Spartan basketball and football. Ortiz moved to WWJ Newsradio 950 in 1991 and went on to produce Detroit Lions football.

Three years later he left Detroit to work as a producer and talk show host at KTRH in Houston, Texas. He covered everything from college football to gymnastics, including 2 NBA championship runs by the Houston Rockets.

He returned to Detroit in 2001 and re-joined WWJ/WXYT. He is currently the morning drive sports anchor for WWJ Newsradio 950 and the Lions Beat and Sideline Reporter on 97.1 FM The Ticket.

You may recall from last year's article, in late 2007, Kris and I bought a '69, Series 2, E-Type FHC from Bruce who lived in El Paso, Texas. Over the next year and a half, the Jag was refurbished all with the intention of hitting the road and seeing how far we could go. You will also recall the economy was in the proverbial toilet and this raised havoc with Kris' employment, so the trip timing was delayed, but it did give us more time to dream about where to go.

Speed ahead to 2014; I'm now retired, and Kris takes a new job with an understanding boss and the flexibility to be gone for three weeks.

Now the serious planning began.

So much to see and so far to go! I think we were both amazed just how many



places there are to visit in the near West. Quite early on we ditched the notion to reach the Pacific; long drive there and a long drive back. Besides, there is so much to see once you get into western South Dakota.

As a youngster, Kris visited several of the National Parks with her parents; I hadn't been to any of them, so they became the focus of the drive. There are also many more non-park places to visit and, quite conveniently, a lot of these are on the same routes. Now the task became; what won't we stop at????

The Jag hadn't been sitting since returning to the road in 2009. I don't recall all the trips,

but it did make Kentucky once or twice (Bourbon Tours!), Kennebunkport, ME (including Hurricane Sandy!), Elkhart Lake, for Historic Races (and a trip on the Badger across Lake Michigan), and several other lesser trips around Michigan and Ohio. All in all, we added another 16,000+/- miles to the Jag. My focus here was gaining confidence the car could sustain a much longer jaunt with no major problems.

But, keeping that in mind, I still wanted to be prepared if something did go wrong and we were in the middle of nowhere. The FHC has a nicely sized luggage area and I figured this would be fully occupied with baggage and on-the-road necessities.

So where to put all the emergency stuff? How about

under the boot floor? Not much room, you reply. Well, not to many "big" spaces, but lots of "little" ones. So my task was figuring out what to take and how to stow it, piece

by piece, in every little nook and cranny around the spare tire and fuel tank.

Determining what to bring was another challenge. I decided to be practical and prepare for nuisance issues; something that could be rectified with simple hand tools and minimal parts. Yes, Duct Tape was one of the first items to make the list. I had previously made a trip to Sears during one of their sales and purchased a variety of hand tools; small socket set; wrenches; screw drivers; pliers; and small cases to hold like things together. Fuel pump! Seems like most of the break downs I hear about are failing fuel pumps, so one of those was included. When the Jag was rebuilt, I put on Dayton tubeless wirewheels; seemed like eliminating the tubes was a good idea. Well, one wheel developed a very slooowww leak so I tossed in a tube "just in case". It fit nicely under the

boot floor, on top of the gas tank. Other items that made the list were:

- √ Fire extinguisher (carried behind the seats)
- √ Jumper cables
 √ Volt meter and test light
- √ Warning reflector ✓ Mechanic's gloves
- √ Rain poncho
 ✓ Extra fuses and light bulbs
- √ Trouble light
 √ Fan belts
 √ Quart of oil
- √ First Aid Kit (carried with luggage)
- ✓ Service manual and parts catalog
- √ Factory jack, hammer, and wheel nut tool

The Jag itself was doing fine, but I did do a complete fluid change and grease job; had the front alignment checked; greased the wheel splines; and had the AC

serviced. The air conditioning had been a welcome upgrade, but on occasion, it seemed to struggle in hot weather at slow speeds. I suspected it was from poor air circulation over the condenser in front of

the radiator. To rectify this, I added a 14" fan in front of the condenser and wired it in to switch on with the AC. This seemed to help a lot, even with the engine cooling.

With the Jag ready, the next task was planning



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

Jaguar Adventure Roadtrip



Next stop was San Francisco. My main object was to meet up with some of the folks I had talked to on the phone, but had never met, when I was working in the sixties as Chief Engineer at a UK car company called Jensen. Part of my job was to keep

in touch with the only US dealer for Jensen cars. The dealership is simply called 'British Motor Car Distributors' – which in the sixties were importers of British cars like MG's, Minis, Jaguars, Rolls Royces, Lotuses... When I arrived in September at the dealer, there weren't many of the original folks left. Some had died, some had moved on, but I did meet some of the loyal men and women who were still there and even remember Jensens, and even some of the problems we had to sort out. It brought back some very happy memories for me, and I was sorry to have to say goodbye to them.

Before I left San Francisco, I managed to get a boat ride to Alcatraz to spend a few hours there. Fascinating stuff. My big surprise was just how small the prison cells are. The audio guide was excellent, even including recordings of some of the ex – inmates.

When I told my Jensen friends that I was hoping to get to San Diego on the Mexican border, they told

me I should take the coast road (101) to Los Angeles, instead of using the boring I-5 Interstate road. So I did so, and was really impressed. For most of the way the road hugs the coast, so there were some

spectacular views, and some quite tricky driving too, so it was often better to see which way the road goes, rather than admire the view!

When I arrived in LA, I had to visit Hollywood, thinking I might see something related to the movies. I was hoping to get inside the theater used for the Oscars, but it was closed when I arrived, so I just drove past it. I had been warned the town of Hollywood is a bit seedy, and so it is, from what I saw of it!

The Queen Mary is still sitting at Long Beach, so I thought I should see how it is surviving. I did a self-guided tour of the ship, including the engine room, which for engineers like me, is the most interesting part of the ship. I had a civilized breakfast before I left, but feeling that my scruffy shorts, T shirts and sandals were not quite the correct dress code for the restaurant.

To keep costs down, I tried to find cheap but well established motels, like Motel 6, throughout the trip. If Veronica had been with me, we would probably have stayed in hotels, but all I needed was a bed each night. On most traveling days I would arrive at my destination mid-afternoon or early evening, spend half an hour or so seeking out, with the help of my

GPS, a motel in a not too dodgy location, then get something to eat, and then get to sleep by about 9:00pm. I would get up the following morning at about 5.00, have a coffee, check car fluids and tire pressures, pay the bill, and be on my way by 5:30. By mid-day I had usually got about 350 miles behind me, so I could still do 200 more miles or so in daylight, if I felt

like it. There were very few days when I got bored on the road. For much of the trip the landscape was spectacular, to a Brit anyway, and when it was a bit boring I had audio books to listen to, in addition to

a satellite radio which worked well, compared to my pathetic FM/AM radio, even in the middle of nowhere.

When I got to San Diego, I took some photos of

a house for a pal of mine who used to live there. My main interest however was the zoo. I already knew it was one of the most famous zoos in the world, so I wanted to see for myself what it was really like. I'm glad I did so. It is the best zoo I have been to, and I've been to a few over the years. Most of the animals are kept in fairly natural surroundings, and seem fairly content with

their lives. To see it all, involves much walking, so I was delighted to find an overhead cable car to take me back to the starting point at the end of about five hours walking in the scorching sun. Incidentally I was only aware of hot weather when I was outside the car. The air conditioner in

car. The air conditioner in the car behaved perfectly throughout the trip, even when the outside temperature was hitting 100 degrees F.

Before I left San Diego I thought it was time to get the car cleaned up, so I soon found, what I thought, was your typical auto car wash...


